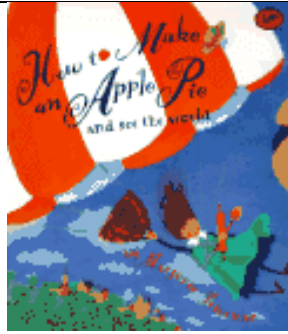

Description: ...a young baker thinks of how to proceed if the market is closed. She directs readers, via various modes of transportation, to gather seminola wheat in Italy, a chicken (for its egg) in France, bark from the kurundu (cinnamon) tree in Sri Lanka, a cow (for butter) in England, salt water and sugar cane in Jamaica, and apples in Vermont. Processing the worldly ingredients is quickly handled, a pie is baked, and friends are invited to share. A look around the table reveals children from all of the countries in which the foods have been found. (From School Library Journal, Amazon.com)

Sample Discussion Questions & Activities:

- 🍏 Have the students identify which of the various ingredients could be found here in Ontario, in Canada or on this Continent.
- 🍏 Could any of the ingredients not available in Ontario be substituted for other local ingredients? Example could an apple pie be made with beet sugar, maple syrup or honey? What could be made?
- 🍏 Pick a recipe and have different groups in the class research each ingredient, tracking how far the ingredients have traveled, and the processes each item undergoes to transform from raw ingredient to final product
- 🍏 For younger grades where research may not be an option – ‘visit’ each location over the course of a day, week or month within the classroom. Set up stations that represent the different countries, where students can learn about other food that travels from that region of the world, recipes, taste testing and more. To make it fun set up a class passport – stamping with stickers or symbols the different places they have ‘visited’.
- 🍏 Field trip ideas – visit an apple orchard or a bakery and explore some of the book’s themes

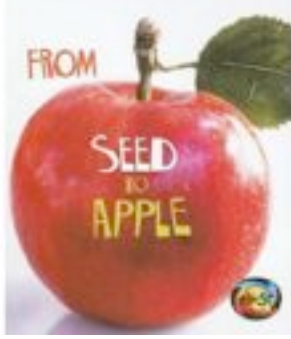

Sample Discussion Questions/Activities:

- 🍏 In the story, one seed turns into a great big apple tree full of ripe fruit. How many apple trees could you grow from one apple? Count the seeds you find in an apple. How many apples grow on a tree? How many new apple trees could grow from one existing apple tree?
- 🍏 At the end of the story, birds, wind, sun and bees are all thanked for providing a delicious red apple. What role did they all play in producing this apple? Why are bees important?



This title contains question boxes that encourage children to make predictions about what is coming up in the text. 

Sample Discussion Questions/Activities:

- 🍏 The season for growing apples in Ontario is spread across 11 months of the year, depending on the variety. Find out the different varieties that are grown here and chart the months they're available.
- 🍏 Did you know... if you planted the seed of a Red Delicious apple, an apple tree will grow, but it won't be a Red Delicious! It's the same for other varieties too. In order to grow the apple you desire, the budded stem needs to be "grafted" to the appropriate rootstock.
- 🍏 Bees are essential for pollination. When feeding on nectar, they transfer pollen from one flower to the next, assisting with fertilization. Choose 5 students out of your class to be bees, the rest can be flowers, and given a small amount of glitter in their palms (one colour each, but different colours across the class). Give half of the flowers a sweet smell (e.g. dot their wrist with some honey or maple syrup) to attract the bees whilst they hold their palms out. The bees have to buzz around, touching their chosen flowers on the palm each time. At the end, some of the flowers should have a mixture of coloured glitter on their hands, meaning they've been pollinated and will produce food. What would happen if we had no more bees?

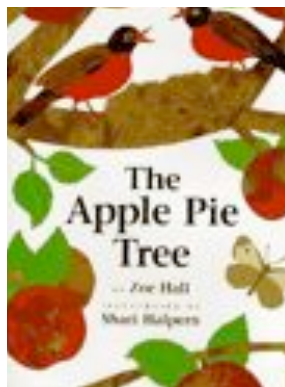
